GI SMART is a 4-year research project that will provide evidence-based recommendations to strengthen the contribution of geographical indications (GIs) to sustainable territorial development and the objectives of the EU Farm to Fork strategy. To achieve this, GI SMART will develop tools and methodologies to foster the implementation of sustainability strategies by GIs producers, ensure their recognition by consumers, and formulate policy recommendations for a better design of GI policies.

Event Description

Geographical Indications play a central role in the competitiveness, sustainability, and identity of European agri-food production. At a time of evolving EU policy and a renewed legal framework for GIs, this one-day European workshop will provide a dedicated space to reflect on how GI producer groups can be better recognised, structured, and supported to unlock their full potential.

The morning sessions will focus on the policy and governance framework shaping the future of GIs. The event will open with the **presentation of the European Committee of the Regions study “How Local and Regional Authorities Support the Recognition and Development of Geographical Indications in their Territory”**, with a particular focus on agricultural GIs.

Following the entry into force of the 2024 EU GI Regulation, which introduces a distinction between producer groups and recognised producer groups, the workshop will also provide a **platform to compare national systems for the recognition of GI producer groups**, through a sharing of experiences with national administrations across EU Member States.

The afternoon will be dedicated to producers and practical experience. Through interactive roundtables, GI producer groups from the wine and food sectors will share concrete approaches **to regulating production potential, creating value, and preserving the value generated by GIs**, highlighting the evolving roles, tasks, and responsibilities of producer groups in different national and sectoral contexts.
